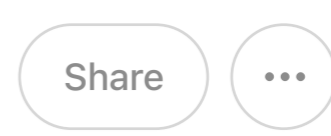
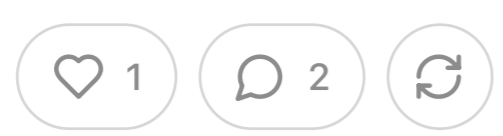


December Recap

안녕하세요, 그리고 새해 복 많이 받으세요! Hello, and Happy New Year!

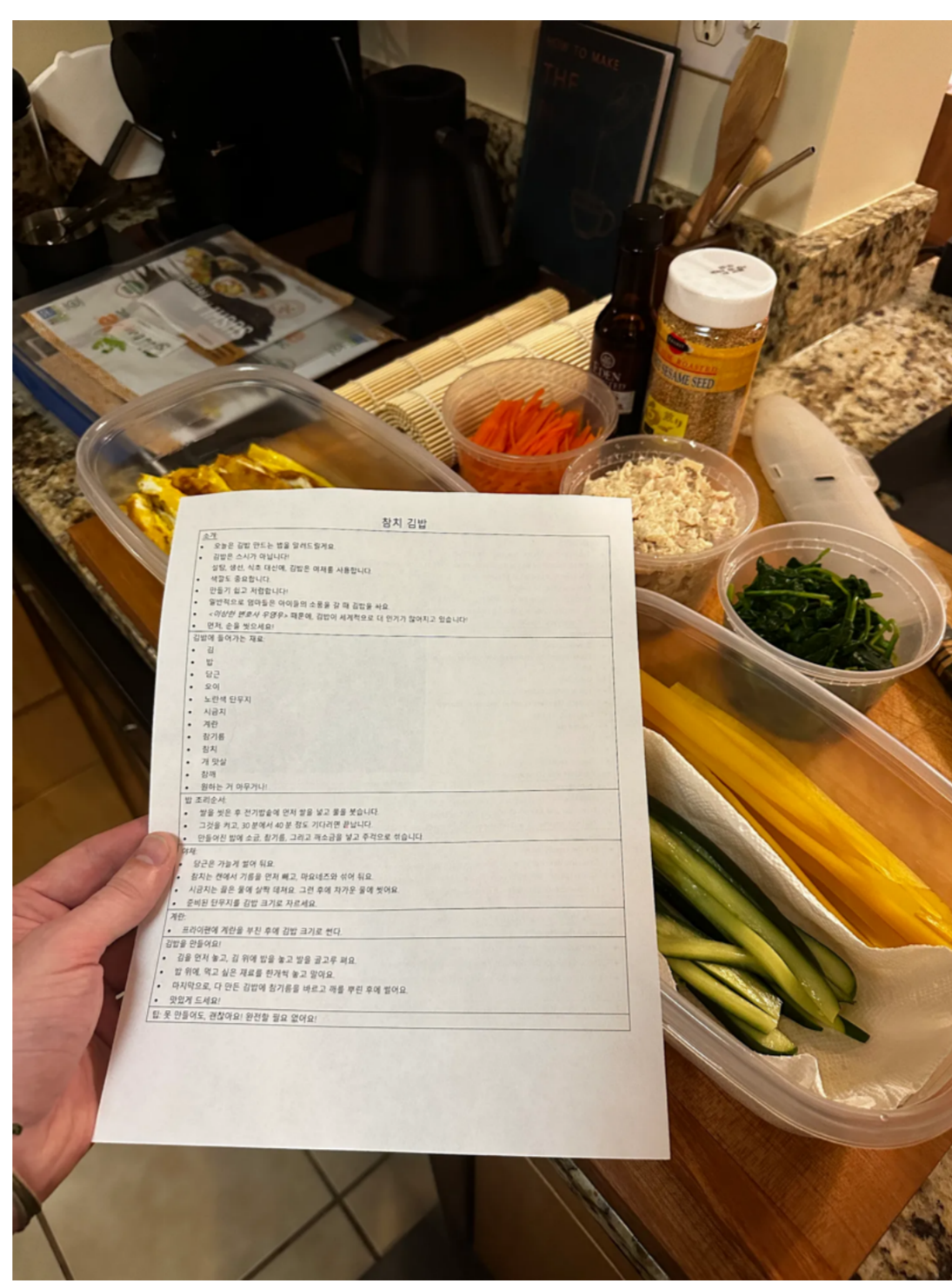

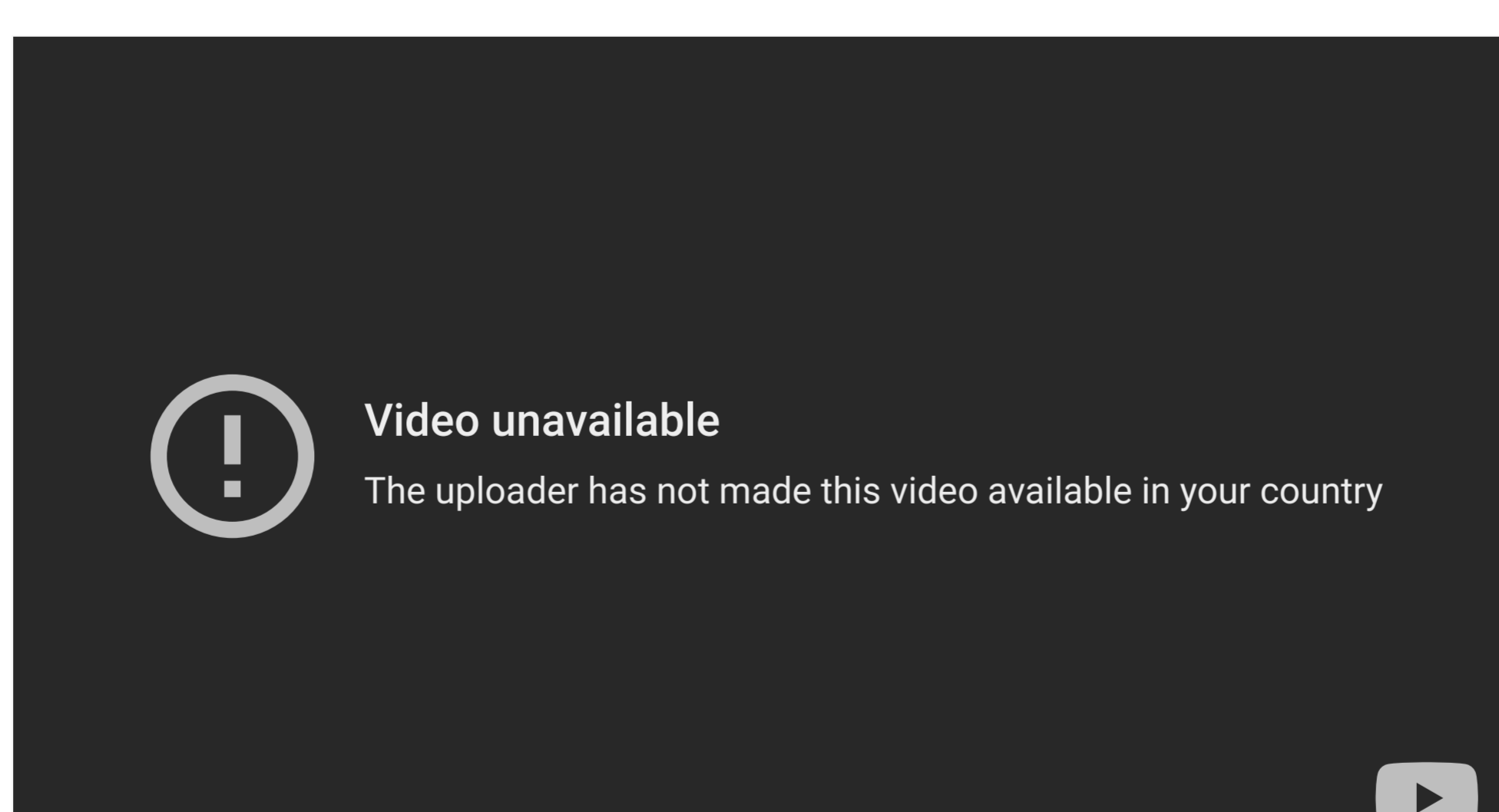

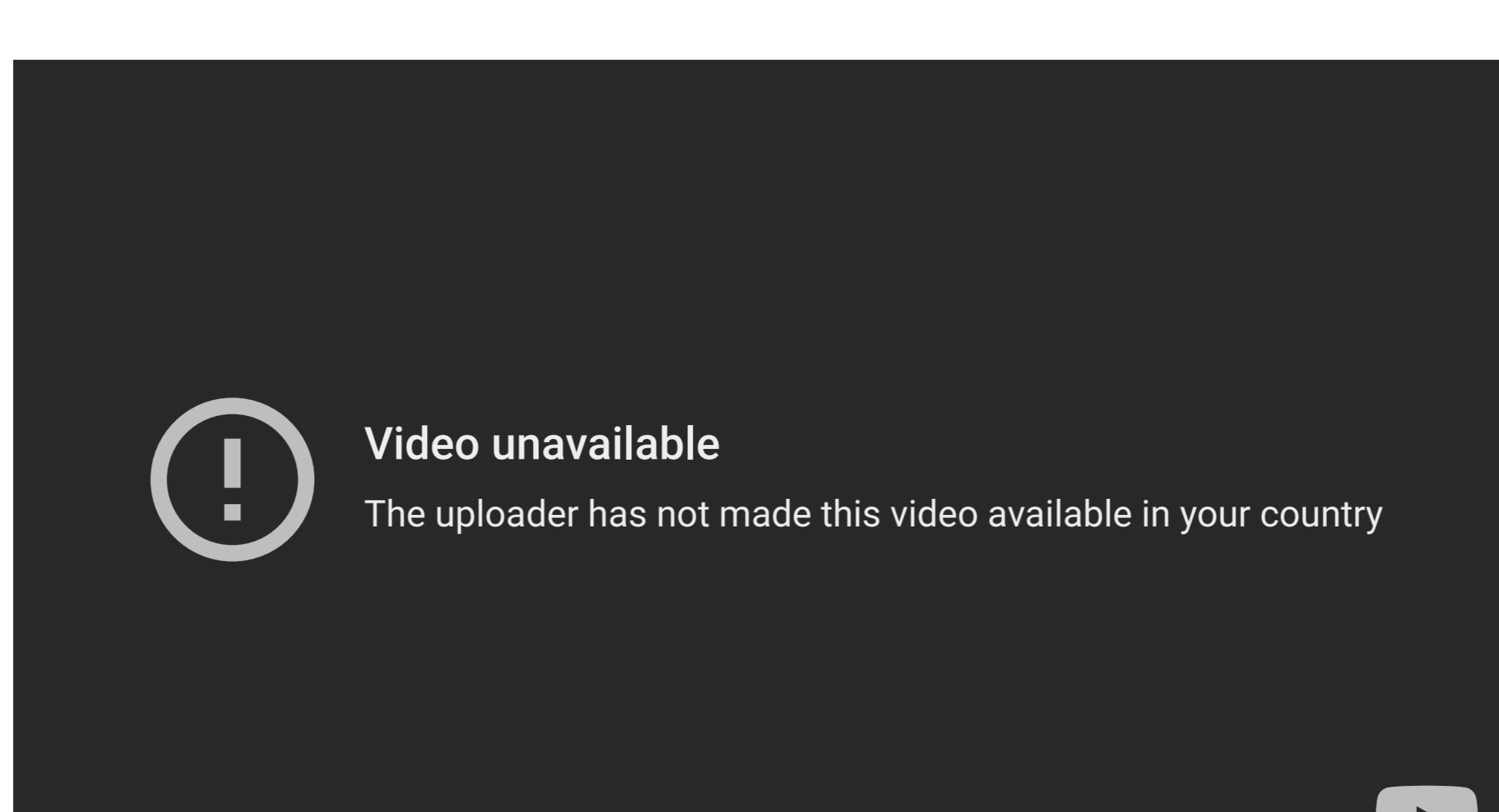
나의 아저씨 (My Mister) was a gloomy show, but it was well worth the watch. It's not my normal k-drama genre, but I was on an IU kick and stumbled upon it. My Mister highlighted life's sadness, disappointments, and other harsh realities of being an adult in a real, unpolished world. It was one of those shows where you need to almost recover after watching an episode and reflect on how it made you feel. All the melancholy and gloom made for incredibly impactful moments that I won't soon forget.



갯마을 차차차 (Hometown Cha-Cha-Cha) was the opposite kind of show. Hometown Cha-Cha-Cha was charming, meandering slice-of-life romcom that I love.
